Our Foundation



We live the vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience in the footsteps of our founder St. Francis. As brothers in Christ, friars live together in community and follow the Gospel way of prayer and humble service.

The Conventual friars are rooted in the establishment of the Order in 1209 and known as the “Friars of the Community.”

The title “conventual” is from *convenire* (*Latin*) meaning “to come together.” The identification was introduced by St. Bonaventure in 1260 as the Order began to mature and friars started forming communities to minister together in cities and universities.

Universal Presence

The heart of the Order is centered in our communal life and continuous ministry at the basilica tombs of St. Francis in Assisi and St. Anthony in Padua in Italy. Going outward, our Conventual friars now serve in 67 countries on six continents.

Local Identity

St. Bonaventure Province was established in 1939. Our friars currently minister in the Archdioceses of Chicago, Milwaukee, and Detroit, and the diocese of Peoria, IL.

What We Do



Each friar contributes to our mission by developing and applying his God-given talents. Teaching, nursing, administering sacraments, and sharing musical or artistic abilities are just some of the ways we build up the Kingdom of God.

We also place special emphasis on serving the most vulnerable groups of society.

The work of the friars flows from the shared fraternal life in our Conventual friaries. Friars live and work at our Basilica of St. Josaphat in Milwaukee, our Kolbe National Shrine and Retreat Center at Marytown in Libertyville, IL and at friaries in Chicago and Wenona, IL, and Dearborn Heights, MI.
