FROM OUR PROVINCIAL

ear Friars, I was privileged to be at the creation of the new province of Our Lady of the Angels on May 5, 2014. Friar Marco Tosca, our Minister General, read the formal degree creating the new province and then gave a brief exhortation to all the friars present challenging us to live our religious life authentically by reflecting on these three challenges: (1) to not be afraid to take a risk when the Lord is calling us to a new ministry or apostolate; (2) to live our religious life in our conventual charism; and (3) to live our religious life so authentically that we "Wake-up" the world to God's presence. These three challenges that our Minister General gave to the friars of the new province are also applicable to us as we prepare for our second session of Chapter. What new ministry or apostolate do we, as St. Bonaventure Province, need to respond to from the Lord? What risk is the Lord inviting us to take both personally and communally? Is the Lord calling me to give up what is familiar and comfortable and go to a new friary or a new ministry? Am I living my religious life authentically witnessing to my conventual lifestyle? Do I see conventual living as a gift to the Church? Do my vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience wake-up the world? Am I living a simple lifestyle? Good questions for all of us to reflect and meditate upon as we continue to respond to our call in being Gospel men, walking in the footsteps of St. Francis of Assisi.
