POVERELLO OUTREACH: HELPING PEOPLE IN RURAL ILLINOIS TOWNS

of Assisi, a financial help ministry was proposed by Friars Luke Poczworowski and Fran McGann to the trustees of the Illinois parishes of St. Mary, (Wenona), St. John the Baptist (Lostant) and St. Patrick (Minonk). Friar Fran had noted how folks in small towns and rural areas were not immune to the economic and employment hardships facing other U.S. citizens; this kind of ministry would afford the congregations an opportunity to share with others what God had loaned to them.

Launched in January 2012 by friar Fran and seven volunteers, The Poverello Outreach To The Poor initially met with clients on a monthly basis. Soon they realized they needed to meet semi-monthly and enlist more volunteers.

In the spirit of St. Francis, the ministry helps folks who want to help themselves. Many find that after exhausting all other resources they are still unable to pay the expenses of basic human needs and services. Most seeking assistance are the truly working poor. They work at minimum wage jobs, often at multiple jobs, yet receive 30 hours or less per week. Others suffer from health issues due to injuries on the job or because of a vehicular accident. Others still have children with severe health issues or have endured other hardships from which they cannot financially recover. Clients are helped with their utility bills and/or rent. Without the assistance. many would face shut-offs and evictions.


The Poverello Outreach concludes its third year, now under the directorship of Friar Juniper Kriss (pictured above with some volunteers) and with the blessings of the new guardian, Friar Stephen McKinley. Both felt truly impressed by the operation of the ministry laid out by Friar Fran and the generosity of the parishioners who have embraced the work as their own. Friar Juniper and nine volunteers continue to meet semi-monthly with clients. Through the generosity of monthly donations at four parishes now ministered by the Conventual Franciscans, over \$48,000 has been disbursed, helping over 100 families! Truly, parishioners have embraced the spirit of the Poverello of Assisi and the marginalized in their communities!

Spring has sprung! The weather is warming up fast here in Kellyville in New South Wales, Australia. Friar Louis Schmid's garden in front of the Shrine of the Unborn is blooming lovely!

During this time, it has been school holidays here and some of the local young people, who have their final year exams, have been coming to our early morning Mass, praying for all the Divine help they can get! They have been encouraged to pray to St Joseph of Cupertino, patron saint of students. In fact, some borrowed his relic for their class! God love them and guide them! I pray that you in the States are not too cold!











