




A Word from Our Provincial

Dear Friars,

Praised be Jesus Christ!

I cannot believe that we are coming to the end of our Easter Season! We have already finished the First Session of Chapter and before you know it we will be gathered in Techny for our Second



Session. I guess the old cliché still applies: *"Time flies when you are having fun!"*

As we end our Easter Season, the Scripture readings at Mass have been telling us that we have an Advocate, the Holy Spirit Jesus promised to His followers, who would to continue to teach, guide, protect, and govern — if they would remain open. God the Holy Spirit, the third person of the Blessed Trinity, the Sanctifier, the One who enables us to say that Jesus is Lord, is so elusive that for centuries The Spirit has been depicted as a dove! St. Francis of Assisi says that the Holy Spirit is the true Minister General of the Order, because for St. Francis it is the Spirit who leads, inspires, guides, and sanctifies us. If we are not following the Spirit, then whom are we following?

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As we prepare for the Second Session of Chapter, we will need to focus on the next four years as a Province. How is the Spirit calling us to live as Franciscans in the third millennium? In our report from our General Visitator we have been challenged not to live a middle class life-style. What is poverty in the third millennium? Do we go back to our Orders' first beginnings where the friars lived in tents and did not even have their own breviary to pray the Divine Office?

Do we see our prayer life as vital – both communal and private? Sometimes the demands of ministry eat up the time that we need to spend with the Lord. How often have we heard that we can only give to the people whom we are called to serve only what we have received from the Lord! Do I dare 'waste' an hour with the Lord for a private holy hour?

Do I see my vocation as a Franciscan to reach out to the marginalized, the refugee, the immigrant, and the foreigner? Most probably in our own family history we have come to this country as immigrants. How do we make our places of ministry, and even the neighborhoods where we live, welcoming?


The notion of collaboration and working with other provinces and jurisdictions is complicated. As it was said at Chapter: "When you collaborate, you gain some and you lose some!" Where is the Spirit calling us to go? Are we like ostriches who bury our heads in the sand, or do we believe that the Spirit will lead and guide us?

How do we really partner with Australia? Yes, to help our brothers in Australia is a wonderful thing, but don't ask me to go! How is the Spirit calling us to be creative?

Ongoing Formation is great! We need to do it! Continuing education should be part and parcel of who we are as friars. When events are planned how fast can we think of an excuse not to go? Sometimes the challenges that we face can be daunting and overwhelming. Sometimes we feel as though we are paralyzed because the challenges seem to be too great and heavy to handle.

We are Franciscans, we are men of the Word and we profess the Gospel! Open to the Holy Spirit, we will continue to do what God is calling us to do! As St. Francis concludes the Rule with his exhortation to the friars, so we meditate and reflect on it as we prepare for the Second Session of Chapter: "O most beloved brothers and sons forever blessed, hear me, hear the voice of your Father; great things we have promised; greater have been promised us. Let us observe the former; let us aspire to the latter. Pleasure is short; punishment, everlasting. Suffering is slight; glory, infinite. Many are called; few are chosen. Retribution for all. Brethren, while we have time, let us do good."

News from Kenya






As many of you know, we have been working with the Kenyan Custody in mission promotion for the last few years. Kenya generously supplies friars to cover mission appeals for us here in the U.S. and we, in turn, provide funding for some of their projects in Kenya. The photos show some recent improvements that funding has helped to put in place at St. Anthony Nursery & Primary School in the city of Meru, a few hours drive north of Nairobi. The friars at the school were recently able to open the school's dormitory (being blessed by one of the friars), thanks to funding for a new fence around the dormitory which is required by law. In addition, funds were used to construct new outhouses and install a new water tank. It is important to note that a good portion of these funds were donated by the family and friends of former novice, Jack Butler, whose father, Jim, died unexpectedly last December. Jack kindly set up a GoFundMe page for the needs of St. Anthony's in his father's memory.

St. Anthony School is comprised of about 250 boys and girls, most of them from poor farming families. Anthony Lajato and Joseph Schenk had the privilege of visiting the school and the friars' other ministry sites in Kenya back in February.







Many guys like nothing more than to think about "*nothing*" once they get out of university for their summer break. Attending a custom *Come & See* weekend does not play well in May. With this in mind, I was talking with our Deacon Tom Gaida. We decided we would like to do a short hike to start off the summer. 



one turned back and chickened out. I missed some of the connections from one trail to another, but we managed to circle around to the point that we ended up hiking our designated hike in reverse direction. All the men made it up the 500-foot bluffs and down on the west side of Devil's Lake, then up again on the slippery granite rock on the east side where some of the men posed at Balancing Rock. The weather was in our favor. The prediction had been 80 degrees with 60 percent chance of rain. Instead there were clear blue skies in 91 degree weather and less then 20 percent humidity. The only difficulty we all had, even with all the bug repellent we sprayed on, were the mosquitos. Ages of the men that hiked this moderate to challenging hike ranged from the late 20s to men in their 60s. The hike took all day and was about 12 miles long.
