Praised be Jesus Christ!

I am reading a book by Matthew Kelly titled: **Perfectly Yourself, Discovering God's Dream For You.** It won't make the best-seller lists for philosophy and

theological books, but it is a solid spiritual book helping its readers to take the time to pause, reflect, meditate, and ask oneself some serious questions to grow as a disciple of Jesus Christ.

Chapter seven's lesson is *Unburden Yourself*, which can be briefly stated: simplify, simplify, simplify. He states that our lives have become burdened with too much stuff – from clothes to shoes to food choices to just too much stuff – that our lives have become filled with clutter, congestion, and confusion. Sometimes it's easier to bemoan the fact that all this clutter, congestion, and confusion fill our lives, making it seem as if we are victims. But deep down it is easier to blame others rather than take control, ask the tough questions, and grow as men of the Gospel – vowed religious who have professed the Gospel of Jesus Christ!

• Do we really know whom we are as individual friars, called by the Lord to walk in the footsteps of St. Francis of Assisi, who so perfectly reflected the light of Christ?



- Do we clearly understand our mission as the Province of St. Bonaventure?
- What is our identity as Franciscan Friars in the Conventual tradition?
- Are the vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience something of the past, or are they just as pertinent today as when St. Francis professed them in the 13th century?
- Why are we still in existence as a Province after eighty years?
- What does it mean to be a Conventual Franciscan in the Third Millennium?
- Is our type of life relevant for today's world?
- Should we merge with another Province?
- In what type of ministries and apostolates should we be involved?

Many more questions will surface in the coming months. Will we have the heroic courage to answer these questions honestly? I think we will because, as some friars believe, we friars do our best work when we are faced with some of our most difficult challenges.

We are about to enter Holy Week, one of the most important times of our faith. Our Lord has shown us that when we stay focused on the will of God, what seems daunting and almost impossible to do can be done. Jesus Christ conquered sin and death and rose from the dead on the third day!

As we enter into Holy Week and celebrate the Paschal Triduum, our faith will be bolstered. We will be reminded again that nothing is impossible with God! Celebrate the upcoming holy days with renewed vigor. Let Jesus' Passion, Death, and Resurrection truly give us the strength and courage to continue our journey as men of the Word, living the Gospel in word and deed, so that for another eighty years St. Bonaventure Province will continue to make a difference, not only in the Franciscan Order but in the world!

# Holy Family in Peoria

On Wednesday, March 20 Friar Giles Gilbert gave a Lenten talk and reflection: "Francis, Poor and Humble: Sign of Contradiction."

After the talk, he hosted a showing of the new documentary film on the life of St. Francis: "St. Francis of Assisi: Sign of Contradiction," which was produced by the Ministry of the Wild Goose and 4PM Media.

## On Friday, March 22 Holy Family hosted a "Corda Pia," inviting all the

friars from our Cluster: Fr. Patrick Greenough, Fr. David Huebner, Br. Juniper Kriss, Fr. Jim Henning, and Fr. Steve McKinley. The "Corda Pia" is one of the oldest devotions of the Franciscan Order in honor of Christ Crucified. It particularly honors the Five Wounds of our Lord Jesus Christ, borne in the stigmata of our Seraphic Father, St. Francis of Assisi. It is traditionally prayed during the Lenten season, especially on Fridays. The theological and spiritual foundation of this devotion is taken from I Peter 2:24 – "By his wounds you were healed." This pious exercise was composed by the Servant of God, Fra Filippo Gesualdi da Castrovillari, Minister General of the Order of Friars Minor Conventual from 1593-1602, later bishop of



Cariati. The name "Corda Pia" comes from the first two words of the opening hymn: "Corda pia inflammantur, dum Francisci celebrantur, stigmatum insignia." It means: "Gentle hearts are set on fire in the telling of Francis' stigmata." Francis conformed himself totally to the Crucified Christ and was signed with the wounds of His Passion. In accord with the fervor of his soul, we honor the Cross and Wounds of Christ, as well as the sorrow of His Most Holy Mother, the Virgin of Sorrows. The program used was adapted by Friar Thomas Fetz OFM Conv. for English-speaking countries from the multi-lingual program used at the tomb of St. Francis.
