FROM OUR PROVINCIAL

***The Lord is risen! Alleluia!
"This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad." Alleluia!***

Happy Easter! Together, we celebrate the 'light of Christ' and the Resurrected Lord as Pilgrims of Hope! Having processed in with the Paschal candle at the Easter Vigil, we rejoice! We rejoice because the Lord's Resurrection has the most profound and central importance for our lives, filling them with a new light and purpose.

We know the darkness all too well. Our sins and petty judgments; our pride and inability to say, *"I am sorry."* It is the darkness in which rich nations expand their wealth while exploiting the poor. HOUSE OF STUDIES (CHICAGO, IL)

Reflection on the Postulancy Year from George Harris, Postulant

Postulancy is coming to its end, and the year has been entirely different than what I expected. Which is funny, because I tried to have almost no expectations coming into it, and yet somehow, I was still wrong. This seems to be an extremely common experience; we are all wrong about what it will be like. Will we be praying 24/7 and learn to become ultra pious? Will we be reading endlessly on Catholic Spirituality? Are we going to help all the poor people of the world? It turns out that it's a little of all of this while also being something even more as well.



Postulancy prepares us to be a member of the Franciscan community, which entails all of these things but also the comradery of an international brotherhood. Reception of First Class Relics of the Franciscan Martyrs of Pariacoto, Peru

On August 9, 1991, in the mountain village of Pariacoto, Peru, two Conventual Franciscan friars, Fr. Michał Tomaszek and Fr. Zbigniew Strzałkowski, were taken by members of the Shining Path group. Accusing the friars of wielding power over the people—despite their mission of serving the poor—the terrorists refused to listen to their explanations. The next day, their bodies were found.

In honor of their witness and to encourage vocations, our Province petitioned for First Class Relics of the martyrs. The relics were presented on March 14, by Br. Jan Hruszowiec, the Postulator for their cause, and Fr. Dawid Furgał. May Blesseds Michał and Zbigniew intercede for us and encouraging us to preach the truth with love and courage.

Reflection written by Br. David towards the end of his life:

"I entered religious life in the late 60's, very influenced by the times and its slogans - "Love Not War," "Flower Power," etc. I wanted to be an activist, but I also yearned for the steadiness of consecrated life. I held down two part-time jobs to pay for the tuition of my Catholic high school. I loved dancing, long hair, porkchop sideburns, and bell bottom trousers! Even today, my tastes remain Peter, Paul, and Mary, Judy Collins, Simon and Garfunkel. Many years have passed - teaching school, ministering in parishes, assisting

in formation, directing choirs and a lot of cooking! With all of this behind me and as I grow into my own illnesses, I can better appreciate our sick and aging friars, their crosses, their prayers, and their good examples...as I hope mine will be too."

A Seat for Everyone: A Heartfelt Campaign

Mary, Mother of God Parish, launched the "A Seat for Everyone" campaign in the spirit of compassion, generosity, and community. The initiative, a partnership between the parish and the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, has garnered emotional and financial support from parishioners. It embodies the Catholic Social Teaching that calls on us to serve others with dignity and compassion, and it provides a meaningful way for the parish to reach out to those on the margins.

The Beginnings of the Campaign

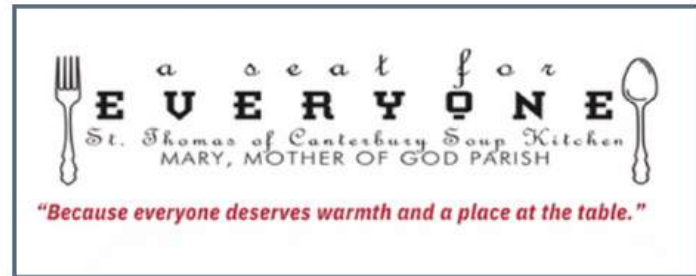
The Society of St. Vincent de Paul wanted to do something meaningful for the soup kitchen guests and find a way for parishioners to be a part of it. *"We thought, why not celebrate Christmas with a useful gift?" said Stephanie Held, the parish's Communications Coordinator. "What if we gave everyone a hoodie, as a symbol of inclusion and welcome, and encourage parishioners to sponsor one?"*

The Gift of a Hoodie

Fr. Alejandro Lopez, OFM Conv., with his graphic design background, created a logo for the hoodies, highlighting that everyone is welcome at the table of the Lord. The hoodies were then gifted to guests at the Soup Kitchen's Christmas party.

Getting the Parish Involved

A Symbol of Hope

Although the hoodie may seem like a simple piece of clothing, it has come to symbolize much more. It stands as a tangible reminder of Catholic Social Teaching and the works of mercy — feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, and serving the marginalized.

Beyond fundraising, "A Seat for Everyone" has also deepened parishioners' commitment to each other and the Lord. *"This campaign really utilizes our talents as a parish," Held says. "From Fr. Alejandro's design expertise to the volunteers who organized the distribution of the hoodies, it's a beautiful display of what we can accomplish when we work together."*

With the success of "A Seat for Everyone," the parish is already considering how to expand the campaign and possibly organize another event during the Easter season.



FROM THE VOCATIONS OFFICE

These first few months are already off to a busy start. In February, Br. Bernard Mary, OFM Conv. was asked to come and share his story with the large group of young men, alongside Bishop Donald Hying of the Diocese of Madison. The men were genuinely interested and there was a great discussion.

Our Parish of Mary, Mother of God in Chicago hosted a Vocations Day for the Religious Education students. Br. Bernard, together with other guests, took turns sharing their faith journey and what led them to their respective Vocations. Brother then ventured up to the Kenyan Friars' presence in the Green Bay Diocese, where he was invited to speak at Masses and present a talk to students. The topic was on Discernment and incorporated the Jubilee Year theme, 'Pilgrims of Hope.'

As the application deadline to enter the CFF Postulancy Program approached, the four applicants came to the House of Studies to undertake the final step. Dr. Barbera Toohill graciously made the trip to administer the psychological evaluations – she is a former parishioner of ours from Holy Family and a good friend of the friars.

Br. Bernard Mary took the long road trip to Bismark, ND, to join the students and staff of the University of Mary for the 'Vocations Jamboree.' Attendees were intrigued by the first-class relics on display at the booth, many young men took materials, and a handful even left their details for follow-up.

While there, Br. Bernard and Sr. Teresa Paul, from the Sisters of the Third Order of St. Francis, made a pilgrimage to the grave of Servant of God Michelle Duppong, a young woman whose Canonization cause has been opened by the Diocese of Bismark. They met Michelle's parents and spent the day on their farm hearing the about her amazing life, battle with cancer, and the miracles already attributed to her intercession.

On the first weekend of April, the House of Studies hosted five men for a Come & See Weekend. A number of other men have expressed a desire to continue discernment with our community.

As our students move onto the next stages of formation, we pray especially for Friars Anthony Ruffolo and Tarcisius Bucca as they prepare for their Solemn Vow pilgrimage and Solemn Profession; for Friar Maximilian Anselm Rewa, as he undertakes a Spanish emersion in Costa Rica; for Friar James Muzzey, as he completes the Novitiate year and professes Simple Vows; for George Harris, who completes Postulancy and will be invested as a Novice Friar in July. and finally for the three men, Joshua, Craig, and Jacob, who have been accepted into the CFF Postulancy Program for 2025-26 with our SB Province and will reside at the Chicago House of Studies from July. Thank you all for your ongoing support of our men in formation, as well as for our efforts in promoting vocations; may the Lord truly bless you, and give you His peace.
